RS700 European Championship and Noble Marine RS700 & RS800 National Championships 2022

Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy

Thursday 28th to Sunday 31st July 2022

Notice of Race (NoR)

The Organising Authority is the Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy (WPNSA) in conjunction with the International RS700, UK RS800 Class Associations and RS Sailing.

1. RULES

- 1.1. The event is governed by the rules as defined in *The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS)*.
- 1.2. The RS Class Association, RS700 & RS800 Class Rules will apply respectively.
- 1.3. The prescriptions of the National Authority will apply.
- 1.4. The notation '[NP]' in a rule means that a boat may not protest another boat for breaking that rule. This changes RRS 60.1(a).
- 1.5. RRS Appendix T will apply.
- 1.6. RRS 31 is changed so that marks other than starting and finishing marks may be touched without penalty.
- 1.7. RRS 35 is changed so that after the first boat has finished, boats may be finished based on their observed position on the course.
- 1.8. RRS 40.1 applies at all times while afloat. [DP].
- 1.9. RRS 63.7 is changed so that in the event of a conflict between the Notice of Race and Sailing Instructions, the Sailing Instructions shall prevail.
- 1.10. The RRS changes will appear in full in the Sailing Instructions. The Sailing Instructions may also change other racing rules.
- 1.11. Protocols relating to COVID-19 may be published at any time and will state if they have a status of a rule. [DP] [NP].

2. SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 2.1. The sailing instructions will be available online at: www.rssailing.com/rsgames, from at least three days prior to the event.

3. COMMUNICATION

- 3.1. The official notice board is located at: www.rssailing.com/rsgames.
- 3.2. From the first warning signal until the end of the last race of the day, except in an emergency, a boat shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats. [DP].

4. ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRY

- 4.1. The event is open to all boats of the RS700 and RS800 Classes.
- 4.2. All helms shall be full members, and crew shall be full or crew members of the RS700 or RS800 Class Association as appropriate.
- 4.3. Eligible boats may enter online at www.rssailing.com/rsgames.
- 4.4. To be considered an entry for the event, a boat shall complete all registration requirements and pay all fees.
- 4.5. All competitors under 18 years of age on the first day of the event are required to complete the Parent/Guardian Consent details as part on the online entry process. Further information regarding the supervision of the competitor will be requested prior to the event.
- 4.6. After entry applications are opened and until the start of the event the Organising Authority will monitor the COVID-19 pandemic or other potential disruptions to the event and, having regard for the health and safety of all participants as well as any government travel restrictions or government mandated conditions on gatherings that affect participation in or conduct of the event, may at its sole discretion:
 - 4.6.1. Postpone or cancel the event
 - 4.6.2. Change the status of the event
 - 4.6.3. Alter the maximum number of entries
 - 4.6.4. Make any other decision deemed necessary in the circumstances.

5. FEES

- 5.1. The entry fees for the RS700 class are as follows and shall be paid in full by the relevant date:
 - 5.1.1. £180 per boat for early bird entries up to midnight on Monday 28th February 2022.
 - 5.1.2. £200 per boat for standard entries from Tuesday 1st March up to midnight on Saturday 30th April 2022.
 - 5.1.3. £220 per boat for late entries from Sunday 1st May 2022 up to midnight on Thursday 30th June 2022.
- 5.2. The entry fees for the RS800 class are as follows and shall be paid in full by the relevant date:
 - 5.2.1. £220 per boat for early bird entries up to midnight on Monday 28th February 2022.
 - 5.2.2. £240 per boat for standard entries from Tuesday 1st March up to midnight on Saturday 30th April 2022.
 - 5.2.3. £260 per boat for late entries from Sunday 1st May 2022 up to midnight on Thursday 30th June 2022.
- 5.3. The closing date for entries is midnight on Thursday 30th June 2022. Entries after this date are at the discretion of the Organising Authority, contact lucy@rssailing.com to request a late entry. If permission is granted there will be an additional late entry fee of £50 per boat.
- 5.4. If a competitor cancels their entry, the refund will be as follows:
 - 5.4.1. A full refund of the entry fee paid less £10 administration fee for cancellations up to midnight on Saturday 30th April 2022.
 - 5.4.2. A refund of 50% of the entry fee paid if cancelled by midnight on Thursday 30th June 2022.
 - 5.4.3. No refunds for cancellations after Thursday 30th June 2022.
- 5.5. Should the Organising Authority cancel the event or reduce the number of competitors, a refund of at least 85% of the entry fee will be made. This will be dependent on the expenditure committed to by, and at the discretion of the Organising Authority.

6. ADVERTISING

- 6.1. Boats may be required to display advertising chosen and supplied by the Organising Authority. See World Sailing Advertising Code.

7. SCHEDULE

- 7.1. Registration will be in the RS Games Office from 09:00 to 17:00 on Wednesday 27th July and from 09:00 to 10:30 on Thursday 28th July 2022.
- 7.2. Equipment inspection will be from 15:00 to 17:00 on Wednesday 27th July and from 09:00 to 10:30 on Thursday 28th July 2022.
- 7.3. There will be a competitor briefing in the RS Sailing Hub at 11:00 on Thursday 28th July 2022.
- 7.4. The schedule is as follows:

- 7.5. The event will consist of 10 races. The intention is that there will be no more than three races a day. However, additional races may be sailed either in advance or arears in order to complete the programme if weather or other reasons dictate.
- 7.6. On the last scheduled day of racing no warning signal will be made after 15:00.

8. EQUIPMENT INSPECTION

- 8.1. Boats shall be available for equipment inspection as shown in NoR 8.2. [DP].
- 8.2. When RS Class Association-approved scales are provided at the event, competitors in classes with performance equalisation shall be measured in accordance with the Class Rules before racing in the event but not more than 24 hours before the first scheduled start. The measurements and the corresponding rack and corrector weight settings shall be recorded on the form provided, available to view by all competitors, and will apply for the duration of the event. If a helm or crew is substituted during the event, the new sailor will be measured before racing and the boat's rack and corrector weight settings adjusted and recorded to suit.
- 8.3. Boats may be inspected at any time.
- 8.4. Boats shall comply with RRS 78.1 when presented for inspection. [DP].

9. VENUE

- 9.1. The venue is the Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy, Osprey Quay, Portland, Dorset, DT5 1SA.
- 9.2. The racing area will be in Portland Harbour or Weymouth Bay.

10. COURSES

- 10.1. RS700 will be outer loop trapezoid finishing to leeward of the committee vessel.
- 10.2. RS800 will be windward-leeward finishing to windward of the committee vessel.

11. PENALTY SYSTEM

- 11.1. RRS 44.1 is changed so that the Two-Turns Penalty is replaced with by the One-Turn Penalty.

12. SCORING

- 12.1. One race is required to be completed to constitute a series.
- 12.2. The RS700 and RS800 classes will be scored separately.
- 12.3. A boat's series score will be calculated as follows:
 - 12.3.1. When fewer than four races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores.
 - 12.3.2. When from four to seven races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score.
 - 12.3.3. When eight or more races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her two worst scores.

13. SUPPORT PERSONS VESSELS [DP]

- 13.1. All support boats will register with the Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy by completing an online Event Support Boat Registration Form at <https://www.wpnsa.org.uk/event-support-boat-registration-form>. Once submitted, a member of staff will contact you to arrange payment of £10 per support boat per day.
- 13.2. All support persons vessels will be required to comply with the Support Boat Regulations in Appendix One.

14. CHARTERED BOATS

- 14.1. Charter boats will be available to book at the time of entry. Details are available on the RS Games website.

15. BERTHING

- 15.1. Boats shall be kept in their assigned spaces whilst in the boat park. [DP] [NP].

16. DATA PROTECTION

- 16.1. The personal information you provide to the organising authority will be used to facilitate your participation in the event. If you have agreed to be bound by the Racing Rules of Sailing and the other rules that govern the event (the rules), the legal basis for processing that personal information is contract. If you are not bound by the rules, the legal basis for processing that personal information is legitimate interest. Your personal information will be stored and used in accordance with the Organising Authority's privacy policy. When required by the rules, personal information may be shared with racingrulesofsailing.org, RYA, your national authority and/or World Sailing. The results of the event and the outcome of any hearing or appeal may be published.

17. RIGHTS TO USE NAMES AND LIKENESS

- 17.1. Competitors automatically grant to the Organising Authority without payment the right in perpetuity to make, use and show any motion pictures, still pictures and live, taped or filmed television of or relating to the event.

18. COVID STATEMENT [DP] [NP]

- 18.1. By taking part in any of the events covered by this notice of race, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that they are responsible for complying with any regulations in force from time to time in respect of COVID-19 and for complying with the WPNSA and Organising Authority COVID-19 procedures. Competitors and support persons shall comply with any reasonable request from an event official. Failure to comply may be misconduct. Reasonable actions by event officials to implement COVID-19 guidance, protocols or legislation, even if they later prove to have been unnecessary, are not improper actions or omissions.

19. RISK STATEMENT

Rule 3 of the Racing Rules of Sailing states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone.'

Sailing is by its nature an unpredictable sport and therefore inherently involves an element of risk. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:

- (a) They are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event;
- (b) They are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and their property whether afloat or ashore;
- (c) They accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own actions or omissions;
- (d) Their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate;
- (e) The provision of a race management team, patrol boats and other officials and volunteers by the event organiser does not relieve them of their own responsibilities;
- (f) The provision of patrol boat cover is limited to such assistance, particularly in extreme weather conditions, as can be practically provided in the circumstances;
- (g) It is their responsibility to familiarise themselves with any risks specific to this venue or this event drawn to their attention in any rules and information produced for the venue or event and to attend any competitors briefing held for the event.

20. INSPECTIONS

- 20.1. The fact that race officials may conduct inspections of a boat does not reduce the responsibilities of each competitor set out in this notice of race.

21. INSURANCE

- 21.1. Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £3,000,000 per incident or the equivalent.

22. PRIZES

22.1. Prizes will be awarded as follows:

RS700 European Champion (first European helm)

RS700 National Champion (first UK helm)

RS700 1st – 5th

RS700 1st Silver

RS700 1st Master (over 50 years of age at start of the event)

RS700 Fidelis Trophy (first helm outside main prizes who has competed in at least three previous RS700 National Championships)

RS700 1st Apprentice (first helm at their first RS700 National Championship)

RS800 National Champion Helm and Crew (first UK helm and crew)

RS800 1st – 6th Helm and Crew

RS800 1st Silver Helm and Crew

RS800 1st Lady Helm

RS800 1st Lady Crew

RS800 1st Youth Helm (aged 22 or under at start of event)

RS800 1st Youth Crew (aged 22 or under at start of event)

RS800 1st Master Helm (aged over 44 at start of the event)

RS800 1st Master Crew (aged over 44 at start of the event)

RS800 Endeavour Helm and Crew (highest score having completed all races)

APPENDIX ONE – SUPPORT BOAT REGULATIONS

1. Support vessels will be required to register at the RS Games Office once at WPNSA and before launching their vessel.
2. On registration coaches will be required to confirm the sail numbers of the boats they are supporting.
3. All support boats are required to display an identification flag whenever on the water during the event. Flags will be assigned when registering and a £20 or €20 cash deposit is required for the flag. The deposit will be returned when the flag is returned to the RS Games Office at the end of the event.
4. RRS 37 will be used. Except when responding to the signal in RRS 37, support boats, coaches and other support persons shall stay at least 100 metres outside areas where boats are racing from the time of the preparatory signal for the first class to start on that course until all boats have finished or retired or the race committee signals a postponement, general recall or abandonment.
5. During the event, support boats shall not tow boats participating in the event unless the race committee have signalled that towing is allowed.
6. In order to prevent fuel spillage, refuelling of boats/tanks is not permitted on the pontoons at WPNSA. Boats may refuel at the Portland Marina fuel pontoon or removable tanks may be taken offsite to be refuelled at a service station.
7. Kill cords shall be worn at all times whilst engines are running. The Course Safety Leader (CSL) will be looking out for compliance on this issue, there are no excuses and boats will be requested to leave the race area immediately if kill cords are not being used appropriately.
8. Personal floatation devices shall be worn by all persons in a support boat at all times, except briefing while adjusting clothing, while on the water.
9. Where possible support boats should agree to carry drinks and small bags for sailors without support boats.
10. All Support Boat drivers shall attend the Support Boat Briefing. Details will be advised in the Sailing Instructions.
11. Support boats shall carry the following equipment on board
 - a. Life jackets / buoyance aids for the driver and all passengers,
 - b. Engine kill cord (also known as a safety lanyard or automatic engine immobiliser) with a spare kill cord on the support boat
 - c. VHF radio - capable of receiving international as well as UK marine channels 37a/M1 (157.850MHz) and P4/M2 (161.425MHz)
 - d. First-aid kit
 - e. Device for making a sound signal
 - f. Compass
 - g. Adequate anchor and tackle for conditions and depth
 - h. Tow rope (minimum 15m long and 10mm thick)
 - i. Knife
12. Each support boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £3,000,000 per incident or the equivalent.
